

The launch in January 2018 of **The Global Salon** earned enthusiastic response—both from English native-speakers and from Germans, as the two *Thüringer Allgemeine* articles posted at *www.roots.TRACES.org* attest. Fifteen people attended our trial-run meeting—over half of whom began with a non-denominational meditation at 11 o'clock, after which those present shared what they experienced during the silence. At 12:30, the rest arrived; the food everyone brought was delicious! At 14:00, we watched a Power Point presentation, *The White Cancer: America and its Ku Klux Klan*, followed by a lively discussion. In February, the host will show *Kickin' the 'Krauts:' Anti-German Hysteria in the American Heartland during World War I*, which will document the beginning of the end of German culture in the United States, despite every fifth American alive today having German ancestry.

The next meeting will be a 3-part event on Sunday, February 25th in Erfurt.

Both—in conjunction with sharing over food—build stronger community bonds.
